



REFUSAL OF PLANNING PERMISSION

Proposal Outline application for demolition of existing buildings and erection of 4 no houses with access and layout to be considered at this stage

At The Coach House, Homecroft Road, Goldthorpe, Barnsley, S63 9DX

Permission is **refused** for the proposals which were the subject of the Application and Plans registered by the Council on 06/07/2020 and described above.

The reasons for the Council's decision to refuse planning permission are:

1. The proposed layout results in a scheme that takes up nearly the whole width of the plot, is tight to the side boundaries, with the front area dominated by parking. This is at odds with the character of the area where frontages are broken up by landscaping and boundary treatments. In addition the layout of the parking would likely result in all vehicles having to enter or exit the site in reverse gear, manoeuvres that would have a greater impact on the free flow of traffic and highway safety than if turning areas had been provided within the site. As such it is the opinion of the Local Planning Authority that the layout represents poor design that fails to take the opportunities available for improving the character and quality of an area and the way it functions contrary to Local plan Policies GD1, T4, and D1, along with the Council's SPD: Design of Housing Development and paragraph 130 of the NPPF.
2. The proposed development will be sited further North than the existing building which will have a greater impact on the existing neighbouring property (no. 13 Homecroft) due to the fact that the front windows of no. 13 will look onto the large gable wall of the proposed development, having a detrimental impact on the residential amenity enjoyed by the neighbours, contrary to Local Plan Policy GD1: General Development.

Pursuant to article 31(1)(cc) of the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) Order 2010 (as amended), the Local Planning Authority have, where possible, made a pre-application advice service available, complied with our Planning Service Charter for Business and otherwise actively engaged with the applicant in dealing with the application.

Please be aware that the Council monitors construction sites and open land within the vicinity such sites in an attempt to prevent fly tipping (i.e. unauthorised deposit of waste on land), which is illegal under the Environmental Protection Act 1990. The penalties for fly-tipping can include:

- a fine of up to £50,000 and*
- up to six months imprisonment on conviction.*

Therefore, if necessary, please ensure that all demolition waste and waste associated with the construction of the approved development is disposed of via approved methods and that documents are retained to prove this.

Appeals to the Secretary of State

If you are aggrieved by the decision of your local planning authority to refuse permission for the proposed development or to grant it subject to conditions, then you can appeal to the Secretary of State under section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

If you want to appeal against your local planning authority's decision then you must do so within 6 months of the date of this notice.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal but will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal.

The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to the Secretary of State that the local planning authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions they imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of any development order and to any directions given under a development order.

If you intend to submit an appeal that you would like examined by inquiry then you must notify the Local Planning Authority and Planning Inspectorate (inquiryappeals@planninginspectorate.gov.uk) at least 10 days before submitting the appeal. Further details are on GOV.UK.

Purchase Notices

If either the Local Planning Authority or the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions refuses permission to develop land or grants it subject to conditions, the owner may claim that he can neither put the land to a reasonably beneficial use in its existing state nor can he render the land capable of a reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted. In these circumstances, the owner may serve a purchase notice on the Council in whose area the land is situated. This notice will require the Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

Compensation

In certain circumstances compensation may be claimed from the Local Planning Authority if permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on reference to the application to him. These circumstances are set out in Sections 114 and related provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
