Connected Worsbrough

Sculpture

This vertical sculpture presents a layered pictorial narrative of Worsbrough, developed directly from stories, memories and ideas gathered through community workshops. The imagery reflects what local people identified as defining moments in the area's history — from early agriculture and milling, through the mining era, to the present day and future generations. The composition reads from bottom to top as a visual timeline, allowing viewers to trace the evolution of place through recognisable symbols and figures. Alongside the visual narrative, a newly commissioned poem by Ian McMillan has been written to echo and expand this story of Worsbrough's development in words.

The lower section references Worsbrough's agricultural and industrial foundations. The water wheel, wheat sheaves and mill architecture speak to early rural life and the importance of the river and flour mill. Above this, the pithead structure and mining figures acknowledge the coal industry that shaped both landscape and identity. The inclusion of working women alongside miners reflects the broader social fabric of the community, recognising contributions often less visibly recorded in traditional monuments.

Water is presented throughout the sculpture as a driving force in Worsbrough's development. The flowing forms at the base suggest the movement of water, while the reservoir and canal boat higher in the composition reference water as a source of industry and transport. The surrounding landscape — rooftops, church tower and open skies — situates these industries within a living, evolving community shaped by both natural and human forces. A line from Ian's poem will be reproduced at large scale along the side of the sculpture, rising vertically through the structure so that language and image move together.

At the summit, a parent lifting a child high above their shoulders symbolises aspiration, protection and hope. The presence of the child reflects the involvement of local young people in the workshops that helped shape the design, ensuring that their voices form part of the narrative. At the same time, the figure represents the future generations who will continue to build and define Worsbrough. Fabricated in Corten steel, whose weathering surface echoes the tones of industry and earth, the sculpture and poem form a single artwork — steel and verse intertwined — creating a collective portrait of place that honours Worsbrough's past, acknowledges its foundations in water and work, and rises confidently toward its future.

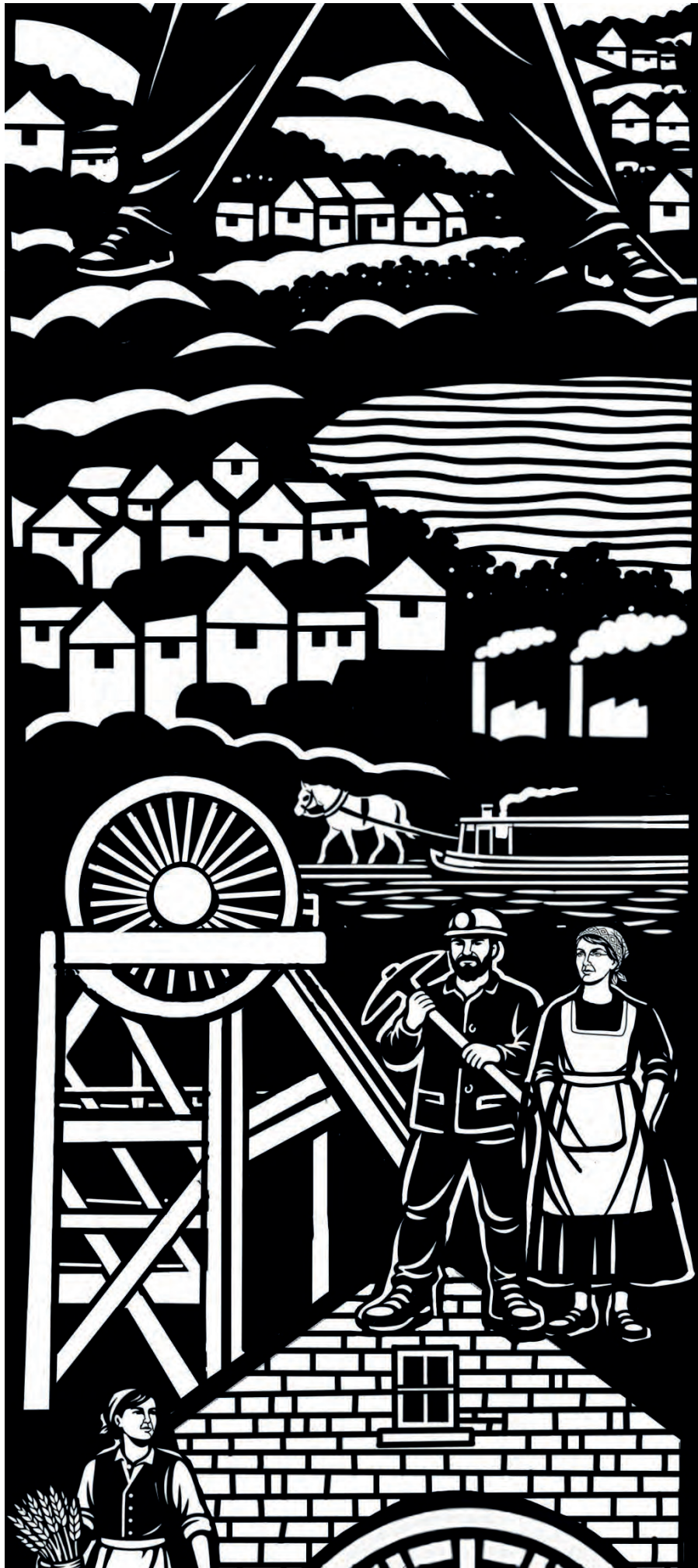

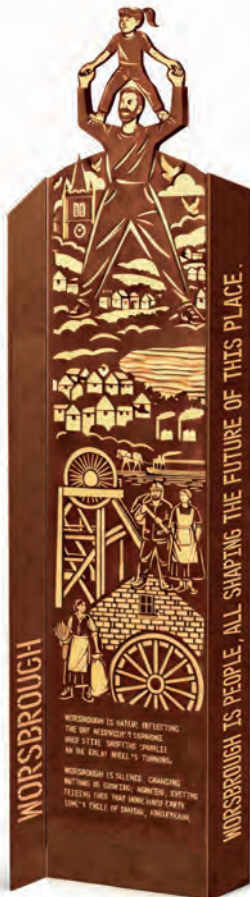

Side View

From the side, the sculpture reveals its two supporting panels. In the view to the right, Section A (shown in grey) is positioned furthest from the viewer, while Section B is the nearest.

The dotted white line indicates where the central panel artwork will be welded into place. The figures will remain visible at the top of the side panels, rising above the supporting structure.

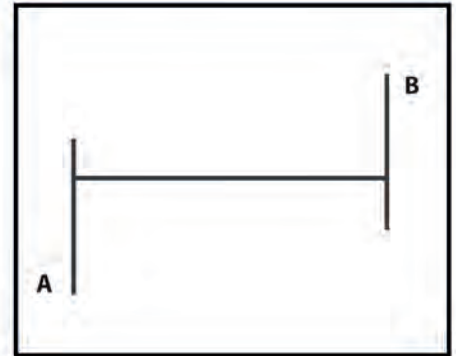

Cross Section

The central panel is supported by two side structures. These provide additional structural strength to the sculpture and also serve as design elements, featuring the word Worsbrough and a line from the poem reproduced at large scale, rising upwards towards the figures positioned at the top of the sculpture.

View from above

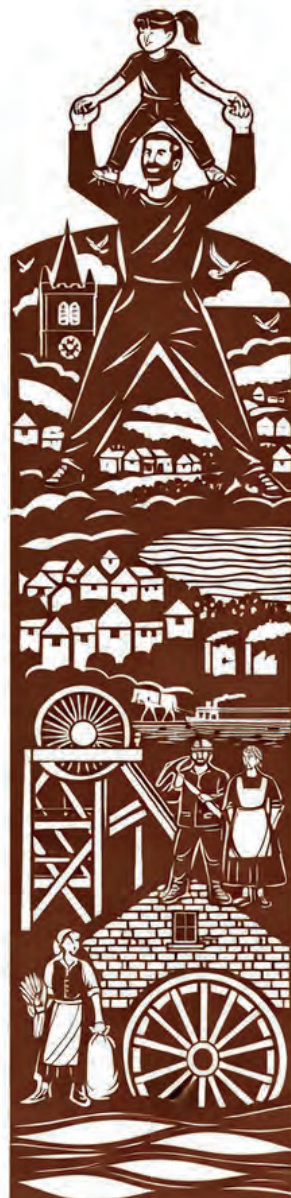
The diagram below shows the welded panels in position. The square represents the base plate to which all components are welded.

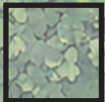

TOMMORROW'S TO (H)OUSTON.

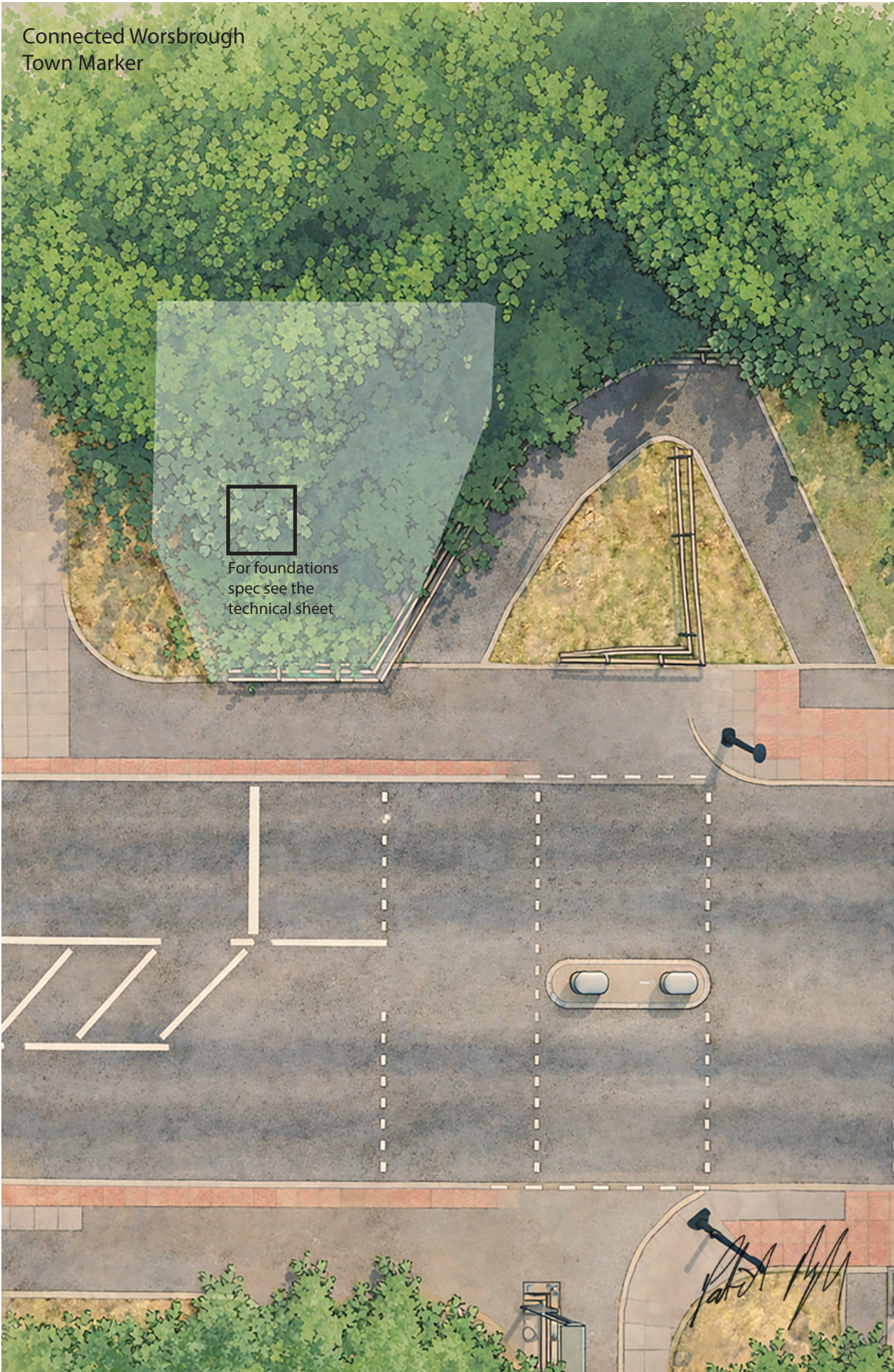

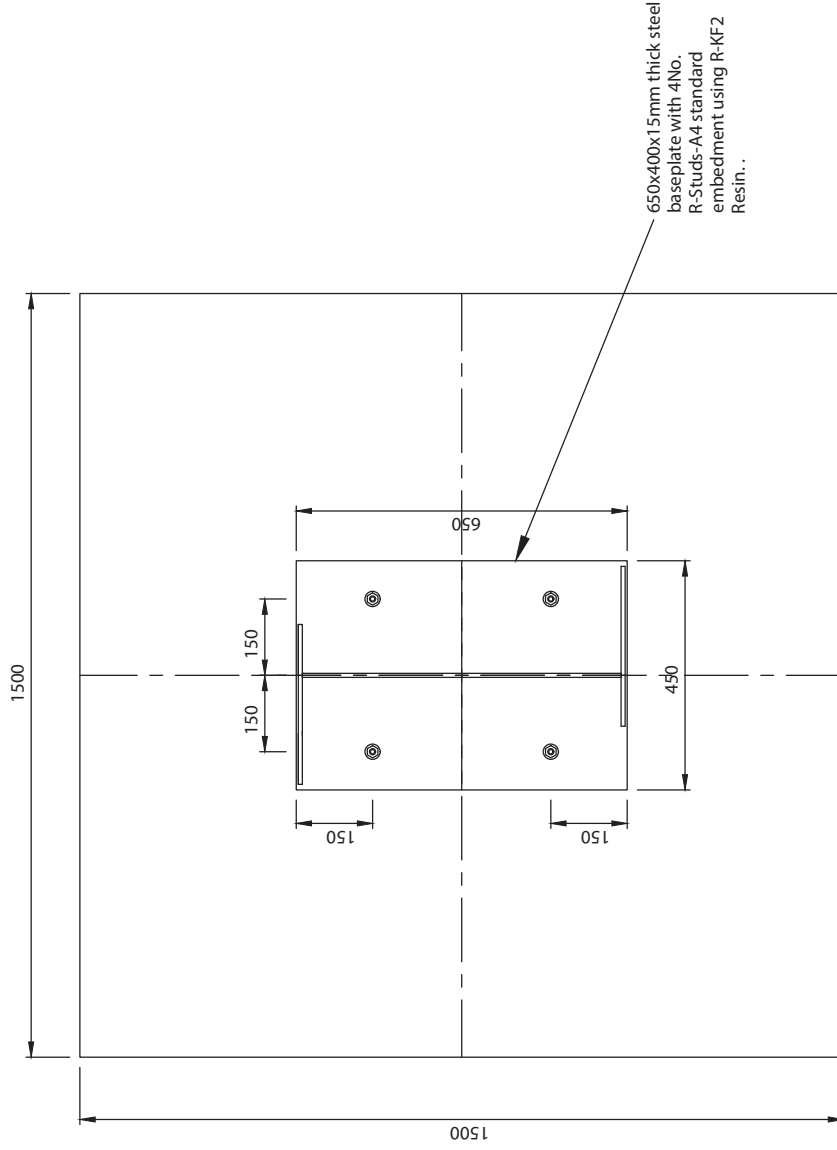

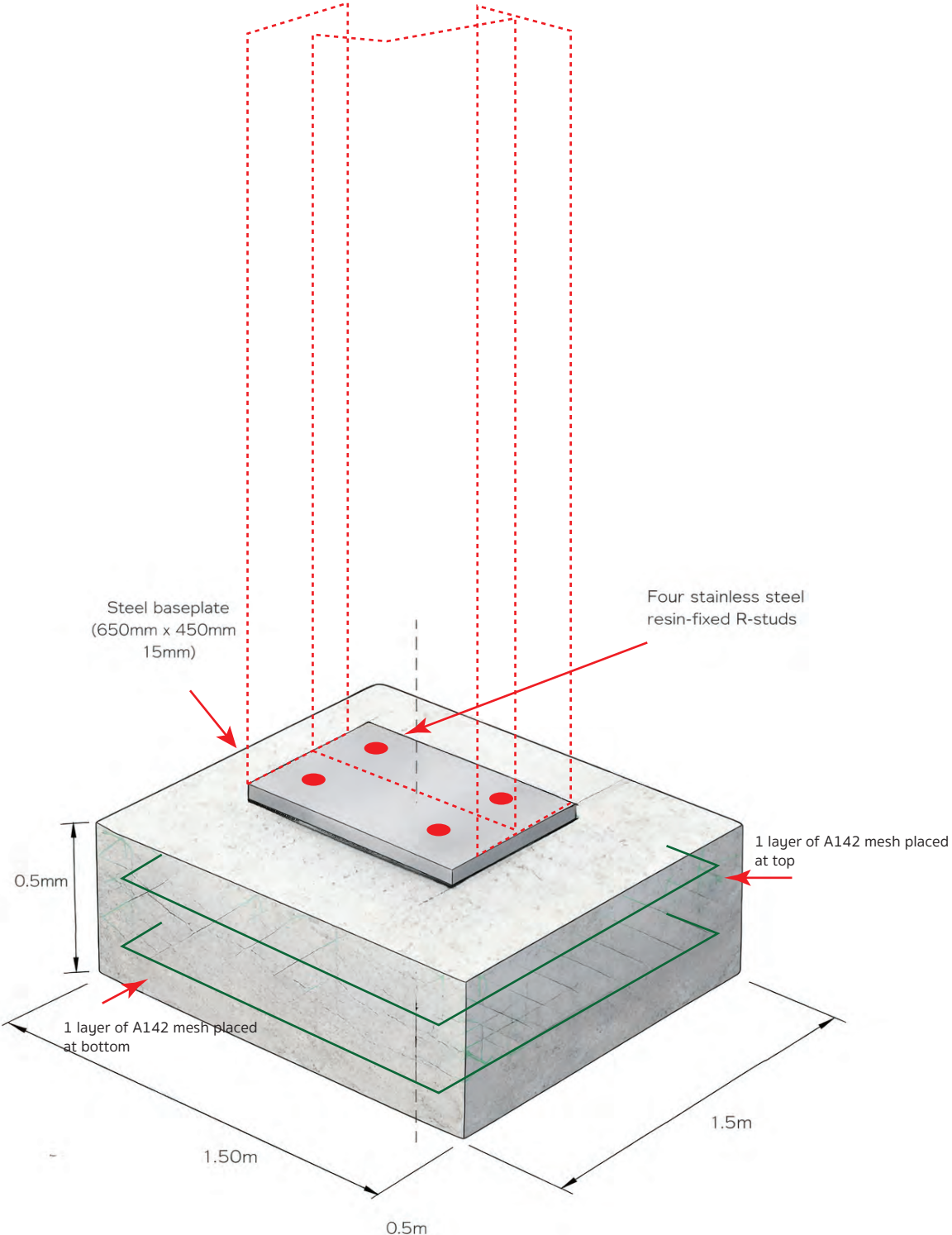
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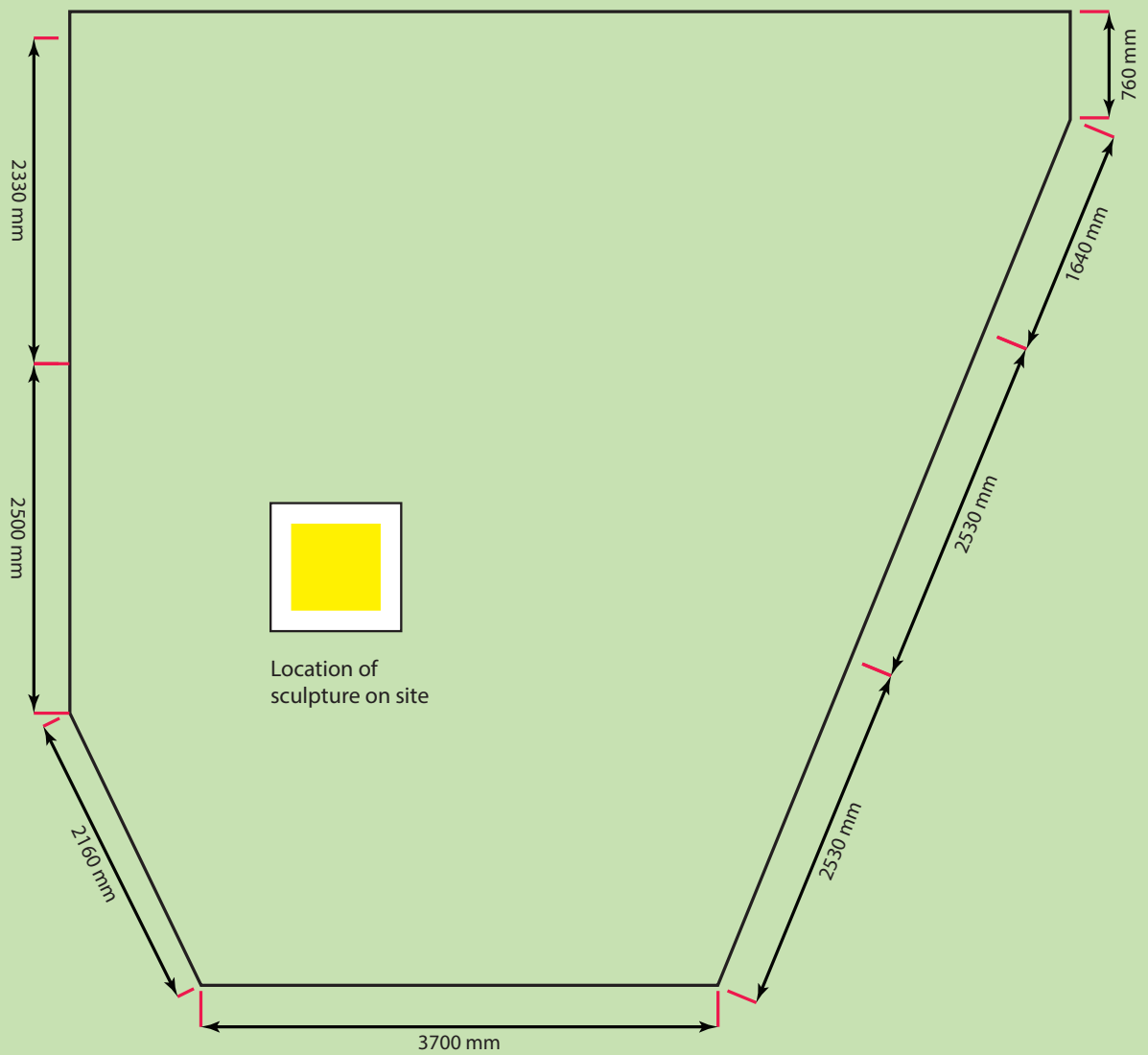
