DESCRIPTION Residential Development of a two storey detached dwelling with attached garage and access alterations (2009/1388 Extension of time limit)

LOCATION 1 Mayberry Drive, Silkstone, Barnsley,

Permission is granted for the proposals which were the subject of the Application and Plans registered by the Council on 09 October 2012 and described above.

The approval is subject on compliance with the following conditions:

- 1 The development hereby permitted shall be begun before the expiration of 3 years from the date of this permission.
Reason: In order to comply with the provision of Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
- 2 The development hereby approved shall be carried out strictly in accordance with the plans (Nos: 0S1, P12 REV C, P11A REV A, B389/S/1 REV A) and specifications as approved unless required by any other conditions in this permission.
Reason: In the interests of the visual amenities of the locality and in accordance with LDF Core Strategy Policy CSP 29, Design.
- 3 No development shall take place until full details of the proposed external materials have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The development shall be carried out in accordance with the approved details.
Reason: In the interests of the visual amenities of the locality and in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 29, Design.
- 4 Nothing shall be permitted to be planted or erected within a strip of land 2.4m deep measured from the adjacent channel of Silkstone Lane which exceeds 1m in height above the level of the adjoining channel.
Reason: In the interest of highway safety, in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 26.

The grant of this consent does not constitute or imply permission, approval or consent by the Local Authority for any other purpose.

- 5 Development shall not commence before arrangements have been entered into to secure highway works to mitigate the effect of the development, and such works shall be completed prior to the development being brought into use. The works (which shall include any Traffic Regulation Order required as a result of the development) shall include without limitation: -
1. Cutting back of the vegetation to the south of the Silkstone Lane access.
 2. Construct footway on Silkstone Lane frontage as shown on the approved plan P12.
- Reason: In the interest of highway safety, in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 26.**
- 6 Prior to the occupation of the dwelling, hereby approved the parking and manoeuvring area within its curtilage shall be surfaced, sealed and drained.
- Reason: In the interest of highway safety, in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 26.**
- 7 Unless otherwise agreed in writing by the local planning authority, no building or other obstruction shall be located over or within 3.0 metres either side of the centre line of the sewers, which cross the site.
- Reason: To prevent damage to the existing sewer and in order to allow sufficient access for maintenance and repair work at all times.**
- 8 Construction or remediation work comprising the use of plant, machinery or equipment, or deliveries of materials shall only take place between the hours of 0800 to 1800 Monday to Friday and 0900 to 1400 on Saturdays and at no time on Sundays or Bank Holidays.
- Reason: In the interests of the amenities of local residents and in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 40, Pollution Control and Protection.**
- 9 The dwellings shall achieve Code Level 3, in accordance with the requirements of the Code for Sustainable Homes: Technical Guide (or such national measure of sustainability for house design that replaces that scheme). No dwelling shall be occupied until a Final Code Certificate has been submitted to the Local Planning Authority certifying that Code Level 3 has been achieved.
- Reason: In the interest of sustainable development in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP2**
- 10 No development shall take place until:
- (a) Full foul and surface water drainage details, including a scheme to reduce surface water run off by at least 30% and a programme of works for implementation, have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority;
 - (b) Porosity tests are carried out in accordance with BRE 365, to demonstrate that the subsoil is suitable for soakaways;
 - (c) Calculations based on the results of these porosity tests to prove that adequate land area is available for the construction of the soakaways;

Thereafter no part of the development shall be occupied or brought into use until the approved scheme has been fully implemented. The scheme shall be retained throughout the life of the development.

Reason: To ensure proper drainage of the area in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 40, Pollution Control and Protection.

Reason(s) for Granting Permission

Pursuant to article 31(1)(cc) of the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) Order 2010 (as amended), the Local Planning Authority have, where possible, made a pre-application advice service available, complied with our Planning Service Charter for Business and otherwise actively engaged with the applicant in dealing with the application.

- 1 The proposed development lies within a coal mining area which may contain unrecorded mining related hazards. If any coal mining feature is encountered during development, this should be reported to The Coal Authority.

- 2 The granting of planning permission does not in any way infer that consent of the landowner is given. Therefore the consent of all relevant landowners is required before proceeding with any development including that of the Council as landowner.

If it should transpire that the applicant does not own any of the land included in this consent then it is the responsibility of the applicant to seek all necessary consents and approvals of the landowner.

Appeals to the Secretary of State

If you are aggrieved by the decision of the Council to grant permission for the proposed development subject to conditions then you can appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions under Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act. If you want to appeal, then you must do so within six months of the date of this notice, using a form which you can get from The Planning Inspectorate, Room 3/24 Hawk Wing, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol, BS1 6PN.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal, but he will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to him that the Local Planning Authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions it imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order and to any directions giving under the order. In practice, the Secretary of State does not refuse to consider appeals solely because the Local Planning Authority based its decision on a direction given by him.

Purchase Notices

If either the Local Planning Authority or the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions refuses permission to develop land or grants it subject to conditions, the owner may claim that he can neither put the land to a reasonably beneficial use in its existing state nor can he render the land capable of a reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted. In these circumstances, the owner may serve a purchase notice on the Council in whose area the land is situated. This notice will require the Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

Compensation

In certain circumstances compensation may be claimed from the Local Planning Authority if permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on reference to the application to him. These circumstances are set out in Sections 114 and related provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
