**DESCRIPTION** Erection of extension to industrial unit and removal of landscaping and parking bays to replace with new parking layout.

**LOCATION** Unit 5, Wharnccliffe Business Park, Middlewoods Way, Athersley South, Barnsley, S71 3HR

Permission is granted for the proposals which were the subject of the Application and Plans registered by the Council on 06 November 2014 and described above.

The approval is subject on compliance with the following conditions:

- 1 The development hereby permitted shall be begun before the expiration of 3 years from the date of this permission.

**Reason: In order to comply with the provision of Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.**


- 2 The development hereby approved shall be carried out strictly in accordance with the amended plans (Nos. AR-1, AR-2 & AR-CP1) and specifications as approved unless required by any other conditions in this permission.

**Reason: In the interests of the visual amenities of the locality accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 29, Design.**

- 3 The external materials shall match those used in the existing building.

**Reason: In the interests of the visual amenities of the locality and in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 29, Design.**

- 4 The parking/manoeuvring facilities, indicated on the submitted plan, shall be surfaced in a solid bound material (i.e. not loose chippings) and made available for the manoeuvring and parking of motor vehicles prior to the extension being brought into use, and shall be retained for that sole purpose at all times.

**Reason: To ensure that satisfactory off-street parking/manoeuvring areas are provided, in the interests of highway safety and the free flow of traffic and in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 26, New Development and Highway Improvement.**

- 5 There shall be no outdoor storage permitted on the site.

**Reason: In the interest of visual and residential amenity in accordance with Core Strategy Policy CSP 40.**

### **Informative(s)**

*Pursuant to article 31(1)(cc) of the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) Order 2010 (as amended), the Local Planning Authority have, where possible, made a pre-application advice service available, complied with our Planning Service Charter for Business and otherwise actively engaged with the applicant in dealing with the application.*

- 1 The proposed development lies within a coal mining area which may contain unrecorded coal mining related hazards. - 2 The granting of planning permission does not in any way infer that consent of the landowner is given. Therefore the consent of all relevant landowners is required before proceeding with any development including that of the Council as landowner.

If it should transpire that the applicant does not own any of the land included in this consent then it is the responsibility of the applicant to seek all necessary consents and approvals of the landowner.

- 3 The decision to grant planning permission has been taken having regard to the saved policies and proposals in the Barnsley Unitary Development Plan, the policies and proposals in the Core Strategy and to all relevant material considerations, including Supplementary Planning Guidance:

## Saved UDP Policies

Policy ED4 'Economic Development and Residential Amenity' - proposals for economic development adjoining or close to housing will be assessed with particular regard to the likely impact on residential amenity.

Policy ED7 'Existing Employment Areas' - Development will normally be permitted for business, industry and storage and distribution. Other employment generating uses may also be permitted if they are compatible with adjoining uses. A1 and A2 uses will not be permitted.

Policy ED10 'growth of existing firms' - the expansion of existing firms will normally be permitted subject to satisfactory standards of design, the amenity of neighbouring uses, and adequate car parking, loading and vehicle manoeuvring facilities.

## Core Strategy Policies

CSP 26 - New Development and Highway Improvement - New Development will be expected to be designed and built to provide safe and secure and convenient access for all road users.

CSP 29 - Design - High quality development will be expected.

CSP 40 - Pollution Control and Protection - We will not allow development of new housing or other environmentally sensitive development where existing air pollution, noise, smell, dust, vibration, light or other pollution levels are unacceptable and there is no reasonable prospect that these can be mitigated against.

## **NOTES:-**

### **Appeals to the Secretary of State**

If you are aggrieved by the decision of the Council to grant permission for the proposed development subject to conditions then you can appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions under Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act. If you want to appeal, then you must do so within six months of the date of this notice, using a form which you can get from The Planning Inspectorate, Room 3/24 Hawk Wing, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol, BS1 6PN.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal, but he will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to him that the Local Planning Authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions it imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order and to any directions giving under the order. In practice, the Secretary of State does not refuse to consider appeals solely because the Local Planning Authority based its decision on a direction given by him.

### **Purchase Notices**

If either the Local Planning Authority or the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions refuses permission to develop land or grants it subject to conditions, the owner may claim that he can neither put the land to a reasonably beneficial use in its existing state nor can he render the land capable of a reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted. In these circumstances, the owner may serve a purchase notice on the Council in whose area the land is situated. This notice will require the Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

### **Compensation**

In certain circumstances compensation may be claimed from the Local Planning Authority if permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on reference to the application to him. These circumstances are set out in Sections 114 and related provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
