DESCRIPTION Erection of stables (Resubmission)
LOCATION The Granary, Caulk Lane, Worsbrough Dale, Barnsley, S70 3QG,

Permission is granted for the proposals which were the subject of the Application and Plans registered by the Council on 23 February 2009 and described above.

The approval is subject on compliance with the following conditions:

- 1 The development hereby permitted shall be begun before the expiration of 3 years from the date of this permission.
Reason: In order to comply with the provision of Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
- 2 The stables shall not be used for any trade or commercial purposes.
Reason: In the interests of the amenities of local residents.
- 3 The parking spaces hereby approved shall be used in connection with the stables only and at no time in conjunction with domestic or trade/commercial purposes.
Reason: In the interest of residential amenity.
- 4 The stables shall be entirely timber construction, as previously approved under application number 2008/0876, unless prior written consent has been given by the Local planning Authority.
Reason: In accordance with UDP policy BE6, Design Standards.

The grant of this consent does not constitute or imply permission, approval or consent by the Local Authority for any other purpose.

Reason(s) for Granting Permission

- 1 Visual amenity - Policy GS9 The proposal complies with Policy GS9 in that the development does not cause any significant harm to the visual amenity of the Green Belt.

Informative(s)

- 1 The decision to grant planning permission has been taken having regard to the policies and proposals in the Barnsley Unitary Development Plan set out below and to all relevant material considerations, including Supplementary Planning Guidance:

Policy GS7 - Development within the Green Belt will not be permitted unless it maintains the openness of the Green Belt.

Policy GS8 - Within the Green belt the construction of new buildings will not be permitted, except in very special circumstances, unless it is for the following purposes; Agriculture or forestry, essential facilities for outdoor sport/recreation, the replacement of existing dwellings.

Policy GS9 - Development within the green belt, or conspicuous from it, should not by reason of its siting, materials or design result in significant harm to the visual amenity of the green belt.

Policy BE2 - Development which would adversely affect the special architectural or historic interest character of listed buildings will not be permitted.

NOTES:-

Appeals to the Secretary of State

If you are aggrieved by the decision of the Council to grant permission for the proposed development subject to conditions then you can appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions under Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act. If you want to appeal, then you must do so within six months of the date of this notice, using a form which you can get from The Planning Inspectorate, Room 3/24 Hawk Wing, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol, BS1 6PN.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal, but he will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to him that the Local Planning Authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions it imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order and to any directions giving under the order. In practice, the Secretary of State does not refuse to consider appeals solely because the Local Planning Authority based its decision on a direction given by him.

Purchase Notices

If either the Local Planning Authority or the Secretary of State for the Environment, Transport and Regions refuses permission to develop land or grants it subject to conditions, the owner may claim that he can neither put the land to a reasonably beneficial use in its existing state nor can he render the land capable of a reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted. In these circumstances, the owner may serve a purchase notice on the Council in whose area the land is situated. This notice will require the Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

Compensation

In certain circumstances compensation may be claimed from the Local Planning Authority if permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on reference to the application to him. These circumstances are set out in Sections 114 and related provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
