The Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015

The location risk assessment, must be reviewed annually, involving local agencies and engaging with wider systems, as appropriate.

Maple children's care home is a spacious detached, 5-bedroom children's home, situated in the small village of Royston Barnsley.

The home can accommodate up to 3 children between 6 -18 years of age and can provide care to children of both genders.

Maple House is for children presenting with behavioural, emotional, and social difficulties and who may have suffered abuse, neglect, exploitation, and exclusion in their life. The children are 'looked after' by local authorities and for whom the best option is residential care.

The care team reflect the culturally and ethnically diverse nature of the local community and provide care and support to children in a flexible and relaxed fashion.

Maple house offers medium to long term placements. Throughout a child's placement they will be supported to help prepare them for the next step in their lives. This could be a return to family, a foster placement or support to move to semi or permanent independence. The staff at Maple House will actively encourage and support all children living at the home to attend education, support to maintain relationships with family and friends, actively enjoy and achieve, whilst ensuring that every child is protected from harm.





Supervision ratios and the provision of a key worker for each child ensures that all children receive the level of support and direction they require to benefit fully from their experience of being cared for at Maple Children's care home.

Maple House is a large; 5 bedroomed detached home. It is situated on a large, but quiet estate. There are 3 children's bedrooms situated on the first floor. In addition to the this there are three bathroom/Shower rooms, a sensory room, and a staff sleep room. Situated on the ground floor is the staff office. This room will not be accessible to children and young people. There is a comfortable lounge, dining room and a games room. The kitchen is a large modern kitchen with all modern appliances. There are sliding doors in the kitchen and the dining room which lead to a beautiful back garden with lots of space for children to play and relax. Lots of light gets into the home which makes it bright and airy.

The home has a small utility room with an extra staff shower room. There is a door which leads to the side of the house. The home has door alarms on the children's bedrooms. This is an extra safety measure that has been put in place to keep the children at the home. These alarms will sound to let staff know when a young person has left their bedroom during the night. There is an alarm system in the staff bedroom and in the office where there is a second sleep space for staff, which will ensure that staff hear the children throughout the night.

The sensory room is a space for children to use, with the staff team. The sensory room has been designed to be a relaxing, chilled space for the children to use at their own leisure. The staff will promote mindfulness, emotional regulation, relaxation techniques and breathing techniques. The children will also be able to listen to music and will have the opportunity to create their own playlist using the homes Tablet.

Overall, the home is warm, inviting, nurturing, and is set within a small community. The home does not present as a children's residential care home. It is in a quiet cul-de-sac.



Popular attractions in the local area include:

The Home is situated in close proximity to Wakefield, Barnsley and Leeds. Below are some of the popular attractions in the area:

Barnsley Metrodome, Barnsley Bowl, Wentworth Castle and Gardens, Maize Maize, Ponderosa Zoo, Soar Trampoline Park, Bradford Ice Area, Barnsley Museum and Discovery centre, Xscape along with many other attractions, walks and museums.

Other local services in the village include, Royston Leisure Centre, pool and Gym, Bowling Alley and also Rabbit Ings nature reserve. There is also a martial Arts and Dance Club located in the village.

Other Services



Other health services such as CAMHS, and sexual health are near the home and can be accessed easily.


Religion and Culture:

Is the home in a community location?	The home is situated in the village of Royston. Local amenities are accessible.	
Are there any risks to children in the immediate location?	The home is situated in a very low risk area of Barnsley. The village of Royston is a small rural village with a population of approximately 10,700. There is a crossing at the crossroads in the village however this is a busy area of Royston. Upon researching the area, there are some concerns with drug users that appear to congregate next to the Co-op shop. There is an alternative supermarket close to the home, and children will be encouraged to use this as an alternative to the Co-op.	
	There is a fishing pond located in Athersley the next village along. This would take approximately 35 minutes to walk or 15 minutes to bike to. All children who are admitted to the home will be spoken to about the dangers of water, all children who are admitted will also be encouraged to participate in swimming lessons should they not be able to swim.	
Is the home in a high crime area?	Consultation has taken place with south Yorkshire police .The crime rates for the area are not of high concerns. Some areas within the village, with higher rates of crime that wherever possible staff will deter children from accessing. These areas are: Midland Road East End Crescent	
Are there any known gangs in the area?	There are no known CSE/CCE or Countyline gangs in the area.

Anti-Social behaviour	 Proactive measures The care team will monitor, record and address concerns should a child return to the home with items they are not known to possess. Staff at the home are working together with the neighbours and community to address any areas of concern in relation to Anti-social behaviour. Close working relationships are maintained with local police to gain regular updates on local area concerns, where there is a concern around anti-social behaviour, we will ask the local village police officer to attend the home. Reactive measures Children monitored appropriately to their risk at the home. Children are monitored up to 1:1 dependant on risk assessment. Time away from carers will be subject to the child's risks assessments. Anti-social behaviour will be addressed with children during key work sessions. Children congregating in groups close to the home will be challenged appropriately due to the perception around groups of youths and how this could appear intimidating to members of the public. Where concerns are raised regarding a child's behaviours escalating to high risks then a strategy meeting will be held with all professionals in relation to the child. All children placed at the home will have an updated behaviour management plan in place which will address behaviours and risk. This will be reviewed and updated accordingly. 			
Criminal damage and arson	Proactive measures • The home has a fire alarm system in place with early warning systems in the event of a			
	 fire. The home has fire equipment in designated areas and the care team are trained in what to do in the event of a fire. The care team and children are to be made fully aware of the fire evacuation process. Educate children during 1:1 session regarding consequences of actions. Strategy meeting to be held with professionals where there are reoccurring concerns. 			



	Staff will have undertaken all aspects of fire training prior to commencing employment within the home.
	Reactive measures
	 Children to be appropriately monitored around the home. Maple House will be a non smoking home. Children will be discouraged to smoke, however if a child is smoking, they will be encouraged to smoke outside in a designated area. Appropriate bins will be provided to minimise all risk of fire. Children will be requested to hand in lighters at night-time. Educate children during 1:1 session regarding consequences of actions. Strategy meeting to be held with professionals where there are reoccurring concerns. All children who are admitted to the home and who smoke will be offered the smoking cessation service with a view to supporting the child to quit smoking. If necessary, notification to Ofsted.

	Educate children on the effects of substances misuse.

 If staff have concerns about a child taking illegal substances, then NHS 111 should be contact for further advice. 999 in the event of a serious concern for life. If necessary, notification to Ofsted.
Proactive
 Build positive relationships with key worker and during key working educate around criminal activity and the risks. Promote positive aspiration, education, and outcomes with child. Children to be closely monitored when in the home dependant on individual risk assessment. Liaise with local officers around known associates and areas children may be gathering. Management to maintain working relationship with the village police office Sam Whitehead.
Reactive
 Record information regarding the child returning with items or leaving with items. One to one key worker sessions with the child around behaviours. PCSO or police to come and speak to the child. Strategy meeting to be held with all professionals. Consult with YOT around this behaviour if involved. If necessary, notification to Ofsted.
 Proactive Children to be made aware of risk and how to keep themselves safe. When children are admitted to the home, the care team are to complete a getting to know you session and build relationships, part of this session is getting to know the area, making sure carers take children to local areas to familiarise themselves with safe places. Key working to be completed around appropriate relationships and peer friendships.



Reactive
 All incidents to be reported to the police by the home should children not feel able to make report. Professionals to be updated of all incidents. Safeguarding policy to be followed. Strategy meetings to be held. Children to access local sexual health clinics. Key work sessions to be completed regarding sexual health. Referral to the Local Safeguarding Children's Board.
 Ofsted Notification if deemed necessary.



	Proactive
Main road and Bus stop	 Staff will show each young person around the local area to ensure that all children are familiar with the roads and bus stops. Key worker will build relationships with children to support Road Safety. Main road could be taken into consideration at referral stage for children who have a history of placing themselves at risk on main roads or who have a prolific history of MFC and CSE. Reactive The care team should be fully aware of the bus times and routes so if a child jumps onto a bus/train it can be followed and intercepted – copies of bus times are to be available in the grab bag. Dependant on risks children are placed on a 1:1 and if they are at risk of going MFC or harming themselves in the road, carers are to follow to prevent them from being at risk. Where the risk escalates the care team will apply safeguarding measures to prevent harm or injury. Where there is a known increased risk within crisis, the care team are to meet with multi agencies and agreed risk management strategies. The staff are to have a grab bag which will hold a torch and hi-vis vests and all the details of the children who have left the home. Children have been made aware of these risks and dangers they put themselves in if they engage in this behaviour.

- Discuss with the children, make them aware of the risks and stranger danger, or the acceptance of gifts for no known reason.
- Discuss ways to keep themselves safe.
- Building positive relationships with the children to help them to build trusting relationships and to feel safe in their environment.
- Police assistance if child is at immediate risk.
- All staff will have read and understood each child's care plan and behaviour management risk plan prior to working with any child placed at the home.

Reactive

- Missing from home protocol to be followed should a child become missing.
- Notifying the Police within the specified timescales as highlighted on the Missing from Home Protocol.
- Return to placement interviews will be carried out in the event that a child goes missing from home within the 72 hours of return to placement.
- The necessary welfare checks will be carried out upon a child's return to placement.
- In the event that a child is at immediate risk of harm and as a very last resort staff will physically intervene. This will be discussed with the local Authority prior to admission to the home.

Rational behind judgment that the home is appropriately located

There are no concerns regarding the area of Royston, Barnsley. Communication with local police has determined that the location is considered as low risk to children. The crime levels are low and there are no concerns with regards to CSE/CCE or county lines within the area. No hotspots were identified within the village. In addition to this the crime rate is low and there are no concerns of anti-social behaviour within the village. A monthly review of local crime rates is available online and the homes manager will continue to monitor these.

The home will continue its relationship with South Yorkshire Police to ensure the safety and well-being of all children admitted to the home. In addition to this further enquiry will be made to the Local Authority in regard to the MACE meetings which are normally held monthly. This will allow Leadership and Management knowledge of any concerns highlighted within the area, including any risky locations or individuals.

The overall risk of the location of the home is assessed as being low risk.
