The Garrison, Hanson Street, Barnsley, S70 2AZ

Hanging advertisement sign (0.6m/0.6m) on the front of the building (Retrospective)

Site Description

The application relates to a Public House within the Regent Street, Church Street and Market Hill Conservation Area and is a grade II listed building. The property was historically a linen warehouse but has currently and in recent history been used as a public house. The building is constructed from tooled stone along with a 20th-century asbestos roof.

Proposed Development

The applicant is seeking permission to install pub façade signage to the south elevation. The proposed sign is approximately 2.8 metres in height and has an approximate projection of 0.6 metre. The proposal is a white coloured hanging sign with the name of the pub 'The Garrison' detailed to both sides of the sign in black font.



Policy Context

Planning decisions should be made in accordance with the current development plan policies unless material considerations indicate otherwise; the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) does not change the statutory status of the development plan as the starting point for decision making. The Local Plan was adopted in January 2019 and is now accompanied by seven masterplan frameworks which apply to the largest site allocations (housing, employment, and mixed-use sites). In addition, the Council has adopted a series of Supplementary Planning Documents and Neighbourhood Plans which provide supporting guidance and specific local policies which are a material consideration in the decision-making process.

The Local Plan review was approved at the full Council meeting held 24th November 2022. The review determined that the Local Plan remains fit for purpose and is adequately delivering its objectives. This means, no updates to the Local Plan, in whole or in part, are to be carried out ahead of a further review. The next review is due to take place in 2027, or earlier, if circumstances require it.

Notification was sent out to neighbouring properties. A site notice was placed nearby, expiring 13th September 2025. No representations have been made.

Assessment

Principle of Development

Barnsley Town Centre is the dominant urban centre in the borough. To ensure that it continues to fulfil its sub-regional role, support will be given to proposals if they would maintain and enhance the vitality and viability of town centre.

The erection of signage is considered acceptable in principle if it would be appropriate in scale and respectful of local character. Any proposal will also be expected to demonstrate that it is not likely to result, directly or indirectly, in an increase in light or other pollution which would unacceptably affect or cause nuisance to the natural and built environment or to people.

Visual Amenity

Well-designed signs can project an image of quality, confidence and permanence; whereas too many or oversized signs can give a cluttered and unattractive appearance which does not relate to either the building or the surrounding area. Excessive illumination causes light pollution and is therefore wasteful of energy. Well directed lighting can, however, aid personal safety within an area and enhance its attractiveness.

The proposed signage provides a modest projection at approximately 0.6 metres. The proposed advertising is non-illuminated and is considered in keeping with the character of the building and conservation area. The colour scheme of white with black font reflects the existing historic street signage of 'George Yard' and 'Hanson Street' located on the south and east elevations respectively. The signage should ensure installation affects the joints between the stone which can be fixed rather than the stone itself in order to prevent unsightly hole filling in the future. As such a condition will be added to protect the frontage for the future.

The proposal is therefore considered to comply with *Local plan Policy D1: High Quality Design and Placemaking* and would be acceptable regarding visual amenity.

Residential Amenity

The proposed signage provides a modest projection which is not impactful on any neighbouring properties. No illumination of the advertisement is in place, preventing any neighbouring impacts from light pollution.

The proposal is therefore considered to comply with *Local Plan Policy GD1: General Development* and *Local Plan Policy POLL1: Pollution Control and Protection* and would be acceptable regarding residential amenity.

Highway Safety

The signage does not provide any illumination which would distract drivers and is positioned a significant height above ground level. The proposal will therefore not significantly interfere with any highway distraction.

The proposal is therefore considered to comply with *Local Plan Policy T4: New Development and Transport Safety* and would be acceptable regarding highway safety.

**Recommendation -
Approve with Conditions**

Conditions

1. The development hereby approved shall be carried out strictly in accordance with the plans
HA-250301 - Existing Combined Drawings

and specifications as approved unless required by any other conditions in this permission.

Reason: In the interests of the visual amenities of the locality and in accordance with Local Plan Policy D1 High Quality Design and Place Making.

2. The signage hereby approved and any future fittings and fixtures will be fitted within the joints of the stonework. Any remaining fitting holes shall be repaired to match the existing fabric.
Reason: In the interests of the visual amenities of the locality and to avoid loss of historic fabric, in accordance with Local Plan Policy HE1 The Historic Environment.
